- Good morning.

- Thank you Matthew for such a heartfelt and profound Welcome to Country. I also acknowledge and pay my respect to the traditional custodians of the land on which we meet today, and extend those respects to their elders past and present.
- This land always was and always will be Aboriginal land.
- Can I begin by thanking the incredible Sydney Children's Choir for their beautiful renditions of the two Anthems – they were truly mesmerizing – as well as Reverend Christopher Waterhouse for his opening prayer and good wishes for our deliberations this week.

- As we gather here in this vibrant city, we are not merely convening a conference; we are carrying forward a legacy that has spanned over a century.
- This assembly, representing the breadth of our Commonwealth's parliamentary community, stands united in a shared purpose - to uphold and advance the ideals of democracy, human rights, and good governance.

- Working out how to appropriately acknowledge the Bicentenary, to sum up a history that has been incredibly successful but also - at times - complex and challenging, has been a difficult task.
- From its humble beginnings through to the robust and representative institution we see today, this year we've tried to <u>reflect</u> honestly on the Legislative's Council's past, to <u>celebrate</u> all that we have achieved and to <u>imagine</u> a future with a strong and vibrant parliament truly representing the society that surrounds it.
- We have celebrated this momentous occasion through a range of events across New South Wales over the past twelve months – seminars, conferences, art exhibitions, regional youth forums, public speaking competitions and so much more.

- In order to capture the themes of Reflect, Celebrate, Imagine, we also commissioned a three-movement composition from the extraordinarily talented students at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music.
- And I am delighted that we are able to now share the third movement of this piece, Acknowledgement of Country, composed by Tullia Cairns, and performed by students of the Con, for you today.
- This piece serves as an acknowledgement to the Gadigal people, the traditional custodians of the land on which this work is being performed.
- Through incorporating calls from native wildlife and imagery responding to the landscape, the composer seeks to honour the land and all that inhabits it.
